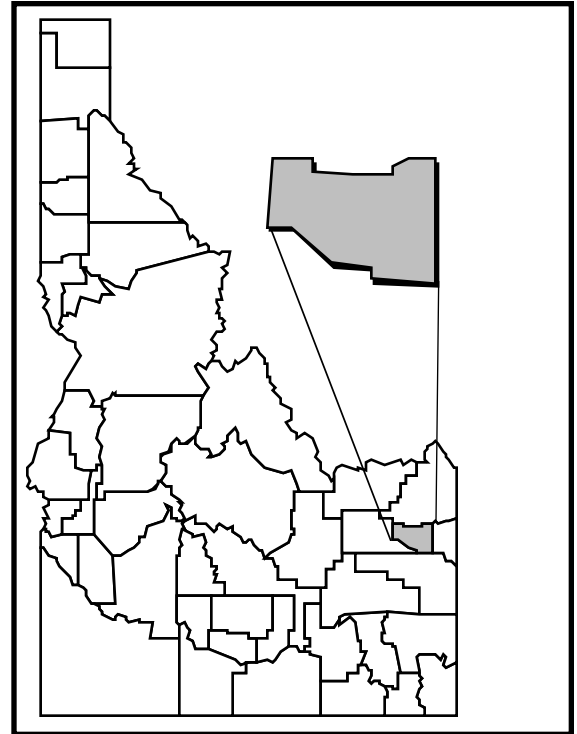

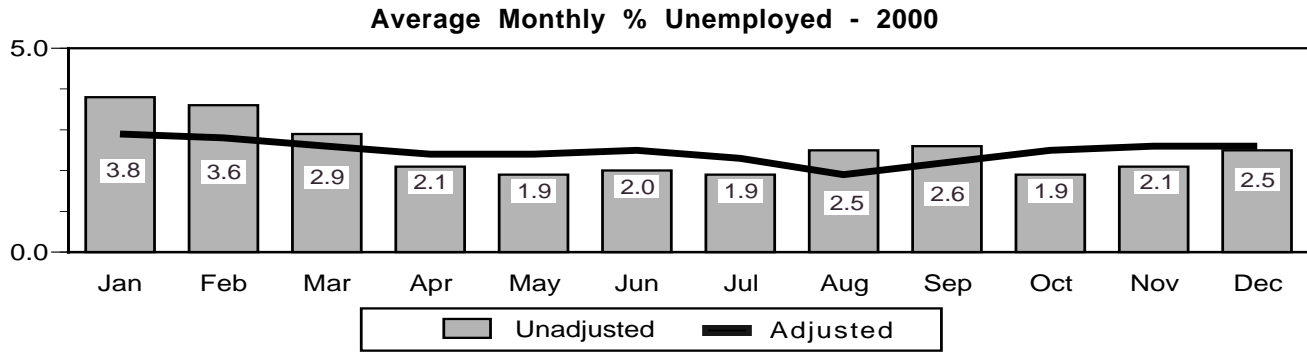

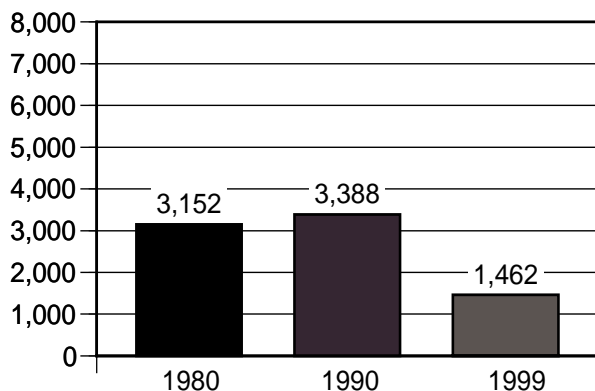

Crime - Number of Offenses

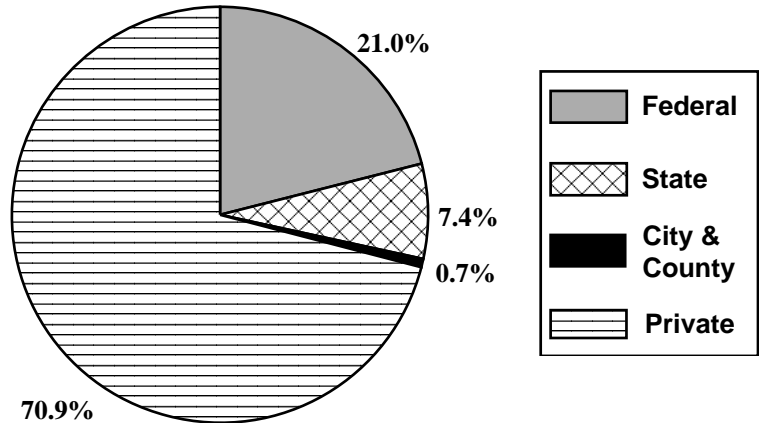

Madison County is located in the eastern Idaho. It ranks 12th among Idaho counties in population and 42nd in area. The federal government owns 21 percent of the county. Ricks College influences the local economy, and trade and service sectors are predominant. Agriculture, government, and food processing also contribute significantly to employment. Annual average total civilian employment increased 33.9 percent from 1990 to 2000. Major employers include Ricks College, Artco, the school districts, Basic American Foods, Rexburg Phone Center, Empro, Western Wats Research, Norsun of Idaho, and Madison Memorial Hospital.

Near Sugar City is the site of the Teton Dam ruins. When the dam collapsed in 1976, over 80 billion gallons of water poured into the valley below, flooding portions of five counties. During late July and early August, Rexburg's annual Idaho International Folk Dance Festival takes place, featuring dance troupes from around the world.
